SAMPLE SCOPE OF WORK

HIV/AIDS Orphans and Other Vulnerable Children (OVC) Intern

Introduction

The HIV/AIDS Orphans and other Vulnerable Children (OVC) Intern will be assigned to the Implementation Support Division in the Bureau for Global Health's Office of HIV/AIDS. The Office of HIV/AIDS is the focus of HIV/AIDS technical leadership for USAID and has primary responsibility for leading the Agency's efforts within President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR).

The intern will primarily support the Office of HIV/AIDS' OVC Technical Advisors and may also carry out other Office and Global Health Bureau-wide duties and collaborative research with other analysts in the Bureau. S/he will focus on program management of orphans and vulnerable children activities, and will be co-managed by two of the OVC technical advisors, but will work closely with the entire Implementation Support Division.

Learning Objective

To gain experience in the provision of technical support to programs for children made vulnerable by AIDS. To gain a greater understanding about PEPFAR and international work being done in the area of HIV/AIDS.

Specific Activities

1. Assist in the technical support of PEPFAR-supported OVC projects
2. Prepare literature reviews and other analytical work as requested
3. Participate in technical assistance discussions with the OVC technical working group and with the field
4. Attend and report back on OVC-related events within and outside USAID as requested
5. Assist in the planning and logistics for technical consultation meetings with key implementing partners
6. Assist in the technical support of PEPFAR-supported OVC projects, including but not limited to the areas of educational support and youth livelihoods

Qualifications

The applicant will be enrolled in a graduate program related to social work, early child development or child psychology. Qualified candidates will have strong writing and analytic skills, and experience in program management, research, and analysis.

Preferred qualifications include experience in a developing nation and/or familiarity with Presidential Initiatives.

This position is limited to applicants possessing at least one month's international experience.
